The History of Santa Claus

Was Odin Santa Claus?

One idea about the origin of Santa Claus comes from the Norse god Odin. One tale says that Odin flew through the sky on a chariot and dropped presents into children's shoes while they slept. Odin's chariot was pulled through the air by a horse with eight legs. Although this story is similar to the story of Santa Claus, some people think that Santa Claus was a kind person named Saint Nicholas.

Who Was Saint Nicholas?

Therefore, on the third night, he chose to stay awake. However, Saint Nicholas saw him waiting at the window and dropped the coins down the chimney instead. When they reached the bottom of the chimney, they landed inside a pair of stockings which had been drying by the fire. In the morning, the third daughter found the sack of coins and all three were saved from becoming enslaved.





Has Santa Claus Always Worn Red?

Today, we see Santa Claus wearing red but this hasn't always been the case. In 1843, 'A Christmas Carol' by Charles Dickens was published and was illustrated by John Leech. In one illustration, the Ghost of Christmas Present is drawn as a man with a beard and a green and white fur coat. Lots of people believe that this was meant to be Santa Claus. A few years later, Thomas Nast, who was famous for creating cartoons, drew Santa Claus wearing a red coat. It is believed that this drawing made people begin to think that Santa Claus wore red instead of green.

Around the world, there are many stories of people who bring gifts to well-behaved children during the winter months.

Explain your answer. **Pupils' own responses, such as: I think that the legend of Odin delivering presents by flying on a chariot is the most likely origin of Santa Claus. This is because it sounds very similar to Santa Claus on his sleigh. Both the sleigh and the chariot are also both pulled by animals which you wouldn't normally expect to be able to fly.**

Accept any sensible response provided that a comparison has been made, such as: Modern-day Santa Claus gives presents whereas Saint Nicholas gave bags of gold. Modern-day Santa Claus also delivers presents to everybody whereas Saint Nicholas chose to only give to those in need.

 Pupils' own responses, such as: Saint Nicholas saved three daughters from enslavement by giving each of them a sack of gold.

In one illustration, the Ghost of Christmas Present is represented as a man with a beard and a green and white fur coat. In 1881, Thomas Nast – a caricaturist – drew Santa Claus wearing a red coat. Many people believe that he took inspiration from the red robes worn by Saint Nicholas and attribute the popularity of this cartoon to the modern notion that Santa Claus dresses in red.

Pupils' own responses, such as: I think that the author has chosen to include this section because it is interesting that Santa Claus hasn't always worn red. It is also interesting to see that Santa Claus's clothes have changed throughout history in the same way that people's clothes have changed and this is probably something that not many people know.

Accept 'Odin', 'Saint Nicholas' or 'neither' provided that a full explanation is also given, such as: I think that Saint Nicholas is the most likely origin of Santa Claus because there are many similarities, such as wearing red and not wanting to be seen while delivering gifts.

Support your answer using evidence from the text.

Pupils' own responses, such as: In the text, it says that Saint Nicholas was 'famous for his kindness and generosity' which means that he likely gave money to other people and not just to the three daughters in the story. Saint Nicholas is also shy because he doesn't want anyone to know that it was him who gave the money to the three daughters.

10. The author does not know the true origin of Santa Claus.

Find evidence from the text which supports this statement.

Pupils' own responses, such as: In the text, the author repeats the phrase 'many people believe' which shows that what they have written isn't a complete fact. They also describe the stories as 'theories' or 'tales' which shows that they are uncertain as to whether they are true or not. If the author knew the true origin of Santa Claus, they would be presenting facts instead of opinions.
